The Rattonian Fame was stunning — and, as an amateur production, absolutely outstanding. Dramatically, musically and choreographically, it was taut, precise and impressive, delivered with great verve and attack. The principals were excellent and the ensemble work was convincing and exciting from end to

end of the stage. Heaven knows how much work went into reaching that level of quality.

We have a second home in Eastbourne and I have been impressed with every Rattonian production in recent years. Eastbourne is very fortunate indeed to have its own company capable of providing such exhilarating entertainment, and on a large stage.
